


As a multi-partisan organization, SC WIL informs, connects, and engages women in leadership in order to increase gender and race representation and the influence of women in elected and appointed office.

Why do we need more women in leadership?

Experience shapes how leaders govern, and women's experiences undoubtedly are different from men's. Women need their experiences and their viewpoints to be heard - and incorporated into policy decisions.

"Feminine" traits like empathy, collaboration, and altruism, which women have long been told are weaknesses are, in fact, precisely the traits we need in our leaders. Women in office have demonstrated the ability to identify common goals and work together across the aisle on key issues to improve communities. And on average, women bring more funding back to their home districts than their male colleagues.
